<p>Teaching, learning and assessment strategies</p>	<p>The course is delivered by using a blended learning approach and a wide variety of teaching methods.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • At level 4 you will be introduced to the core theories and schools of thought underpinning our understanding of psychology providing a historical context to the discipline and an overview of the breadth of the subject. There are opportunities within teaching sessions to ask questions and to develop key academic skills essential to higher education. These include communication skills such as researching, writing, listening, presenting, IT, statistical literacy and working with peers. Also, you will gain an understanding of what it is to be a psychology undergraduate, with a strong focus on ethical and professional behaviour. • At level 5 you will have the opportunity to go into depth in the theories introduced at level 4 and also to have more of an appreciation how these theories are applied in a professional or everyday environment. Your skills will also develop as you start to work more independently and are taught how to use more critical analysis and synthesis of information. You will be supported to improve your academic writing and your research methods. • At level 6 the theories that you have been taught will be developed further with an expectation of wider reading and critical thinking. You will work with a supervisor to undertake your own piece of library-based research where you will undertake a critical review of the literature and then present your findings in writing and orally. At this level you will also gain more of an understanding of how professionals in the sector use psychology in their practice. <p>The learning and teaching strategy aims to develop your resilience, autonomy, team-working and to enhance your knowledge of psychological issues, theories and practise along with your research and analytic skills.</p> <p>The Virtual Learning Environment is used in a variety of ways including e-learning, collaboration and formative and summative assessments.</p> <p>Staff are research active or engage in professional practice and teach in areas that reflect and incorporate their expertise and you will get the opportunity to work with staff on research projects.</p>
